And now, the goal to get close to the girls has been achieved. Through many hours of talking over coffee or before and after church, those relationships have grown more than I imagined. I'm looking forward to coming back to Utah and continue those friendships.

Overall, my time here in Salt Lake City has been fantastic! And its not over just yet! In about 2 months, I will travel back to Utah to begin college and continue growing the relationships made here. I plan to make Utah my home at least until I finish college. I have always been interested in being a nurse, so I'll begin classes for that and eventually work my way up to a doctor. I'd like to use those skills to work overseas.

The local church has taught me many things from the first time I stepped into the church. I was surprised to see how different things were done there and how small and intimate the family was. What surprised me the most was how hard everyone worked to reach out to the community and how much they genuinely cared for others. The next thing to surprise me was how well the church responded to their Mormon community, not spitefully but with love. I have learned that in 14 months, I'm curious to see how much I can learn in a few years.

Though I am finished with my AIM time, I still need to graduate. My whole class will graduate in Lubbock, Texas in March of 2014.
